
















- Adoption

Family secrets & hidden pasts






Your final manuscript... Resolution Problem / revelation Obstacle / cliffhanger Problem / revelation / Set-up minor twist Research / investigation Research / Research / major plot twist cliffhanger



- You're going to achieve this by (usually) switching between two timelines.
- Past / present or past past / present present or in a way which works for you
- Modern narrative is usually driven forwards by the main genealogist character conducting genealogical research
- Past narrative is usually driven forwards by the characters and their story (tied around the central themes)






Grace glanced up at him as if he were the greater distraction, shrugged and carried on with her book.




Here are five potential book titles that fit your genealogical crime mystery genre:

- 5. "Buried in the Waves"


These titles incorporate themes of inheritance, the storm, and the genealogical investigation that connects both timelines.



- Trademarks are a BIG no!

Traditional or Self-Publish route?

Pros of self-publishing for me:

- Significantly higher royalties
- Complete creative freedom
- Protect own brand
- Flexibility (deadlines / future projects, etc)

Cons of self-publishing for me:

- All marketing / publicity is down to me (& my team)
- Advertising is down to me (& my team)
- Every aspect of publication / book covers / proof readers / editors, etc is down to me
- All of the above costs money!
- Harder to get in regular book stores
- Easier to get any of the above wrong!

Pros of traditional publishing for me:

- All marketing / publicity is done in-house (if they do it!)
- Expert teams for cover design / proofing / editing (but they still get it wrong)
- They cover the costs of everything (prior to paying out royalties)
- Easier access to book stores


Cons of traditional publishing for me:

- Significantly lower royalties
- They control your name and brand
- Vague commitments in contracts with regard to marketing and publicity
- Usually tied to them for future books
- Spend 90% of their marketing budget on top 10% of authors
